


ABRAHAM TEMESGEN GELMESSA: A SUMMER OF ENTREPRENEURSHIP AND GLOBAL LEADERSHIP

SEA INITIATIVE BY ELIKEM ASEM, SOMPA BAAH, AND AFRICA SAKYI-ADDO

During the summer break, DPI students Elikem Asem, Sompa Baah, and Africa Sakyi-Addo, launched a project called "SEA" to support inmates at the Senior Correctional Center for Boys in Accra. Over two months, they raised over 10,000 GHC through sticker sales and donations, which they used to purchase essential supplies like belts, socks, toothbrushes, boxers, school bags, and a projector.

The team also organized a book drive, gathering donations from various sources, including the Valco Library and Resource Centre at SOS-HGIC. On August 8th, just before their summer break ended, they visited the correctional center to donate these items, interact with the juveniles, and witness a service by Regain Hope, the organization they partnered with. Their initiative was a resounding success, exceeding their goals and positively impacting the community.







KIMBERLY JOY SEFADZI SOUSSOUDIS: A SUMMER OF PHILANTHROPY AND ADVOCACY





During the summer, MYP5 student Kimberly Joy Sefadzi Soussoudis, a student at SOS-HGIC and founder of the NGO Sisike, made a significant impact by donating stationery to 150 students at St. Kizito Senior High School in Mepe, marking the successful completion of her NGO's first initiative. In addition to her philanthropic efforts, Kimberly also focused on raising awareness about heart health by creating a podcast. She developed animations, designed informative posters, and conducted interviews with medical professionals to highlight the harmful effects of smoking on the heart.
